Tip of the Month **Tools of the Trade** – by Barb Tyler

If you are new to the hobby and have purchased your first detector, you might be wondering about all the "stuff" that came with it — unless of course you bought it from a local dealer who took the time to explain the operation of your new equipment and the tools that came with it. But if you didn't, here are some of the things you might have received, or need to consider as your next purchase:

Headphones are a must to minimize outside noises like

traffic or children playing (or asking too many questions). They also enable you to hear the sub-



tle sounds from your detector that you might otherwise miss. Keep in mind, headphones are to a detector like speakers are to a stereo system. You're not going to pay

several hundred dollars for a stereo system so you can attach a \$20 set of flea market speakers to it! The quality of sound is in the speakers. Same with the headphones. Though there are some less expensive headphones on the market that work very well, the better the headphones the better the target sound coming from your detector. Keep in mind the weather as well. Those large bulky headphones can be rather uncomfortable in the hot summer months: consider a lighter weight pair for warmer days. Headphones also help your batteries last longer.

Diggers are very important – unless you expect to talk your find out of the ground! A digger is a personal item; not everyone is comfortable using the same thing. Consider the type of detecting you will be doing before you select your digging tool. If you are only

going to be hunting beaches, you probably



don't need a large knife type tool with a serrated edge to it for digging plugs and cutting through tree roots; you'll need a sand scoop with holes in it to allow the sand to flow through but not your find.

If you are detecting ghost towns, you'll want a small shovel; there aren't any groomed lawns to worry about so using a pick or probe type tool with a rounded point to pop a quarter out of the ground, isn't required. Personally, I would recommend



you have one of each tool that I just mentioned; because you never really know the type of detecting

you might be doing and it's always good to BE PREPARED!

A **Pouch or Apron** is necessary unless you plan to put all of your finds — including the sharp metal trash — into your

pocket! I wouldn't suggest it! Pouches are again something that is personal, you have to pick what is right



for you not what works for someone else. You might try using a tool belt from your lo-

cal hardware store; or a carpenters apron. Or support some local detectorist who makes a bag especially for this hobby. It's a good thing to have a pouch with enough pockets, because as I've found, I need a pocket for my good finds, a bigger one for the trash, and one or two for the tools I dig with and other things I think I have to have with me at all times.

Pinpointers are valuable tools that shouldn't be left behind. They are little electronic de-



vices or mini detectors. They are great for pinpointing

the target inside the hole you have dug or in the plug you have removed. They help minimize the potential for scratching a good find. There is a wide variety of these on the market, so once again I find that personal preference is important. But they are a must for any detecting pouch!

Batteries are a Forget-Me-Knot. Don't ever leave home without an extra set or two or three. You don't want to discover out in the middle of a productive field, several miles from the nearest store, and with only hours to detect, that your batteries are going dead and you don't have any spares.

A Magnifying

Glass is handy for examining your find in the field – if you



can't wait to get home to see the key date on a coin or the engraving on the inside of a ring.

Gloves, First Aid Kit, Water and toilet paper are personal items that should be in every detecting bag. Depending on the type of detecting you plan to do, there are numerous other items you might want to have in your arsenal - it certainly wouldn't be a mistake having them that's for sure! They might include: plastic buckets, trash bags or other trash container, sifting tray, hat or sun visor, sturdy pair of shoes or boots, kneepads, mosquito repellent, suntan lotion, chapstick, handy-wipes, bag for your detector, rain gear for yourself and your detector, GPS unit and/or maps, cell phone or two-way radio, gold pan, gold bottle, eye dropper, tweezers....and the list goes on.

Detecting is a personal hobby; be prepared to make several choices along the way until you find the right tools to meet your needs and that work for you. Eventually you'll narrow down the tools to just a few faithful ones that you take everywhere you go, and by then, everything else can go on Ebay. $\frac{1}{3}$
